Before you apply:

- Go to the information sessions
- Have a clear idea of why you're applying and what each hospital offers you
- Don't listen to all the rumours about what each hospital wants or who they take, apply where you want to go

Applying:

- Be specific about your unique experiences and transferable skills
- Utilise resources universities, friends, family, online guides
- Be yourself!

The interview:

- Practice!! Record yourself, with friends, with family
- Have a structure you can rely on for the curveball questions but don't be rigid with this!
- (Identify issue, Patient safety, gather information, hospital protocols, escalate, document, debrief/reflect)
- Take a deep breath! Smile! Avoid talking around the question!

- ECMO
- Major trauma, including limb and chest trauma, penetrating trauma, MVA, HEMs retrieval patients.
- Lung transplant patients, including paediatric patients (only hospital in Australia!)

- Pleural taps
- Hickman catheter insertions / use for epoprostenol
- Multi-team involvement in critically unwell / complex patients

Key Tips

- Try and look into the camera or at the screen rather than around the room or at your notes.
- Use the STAR model for your responses.
 - o **Situation:** be specific, use real life examples, past experiences that are relevant
 - o **Task:** refer to your specific role/responsibility, expand on barriers and challenges
 - Action: discuss how you made a positive impact
 - Result: what was the outcome, what were the benefits, your reflections and what you learnt
- Speak confidently, have some different scenarios prepared.
- Record and time yourself attempting some practice interview questions.
- Practice, practice, practice!
